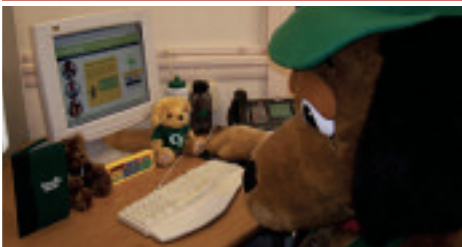

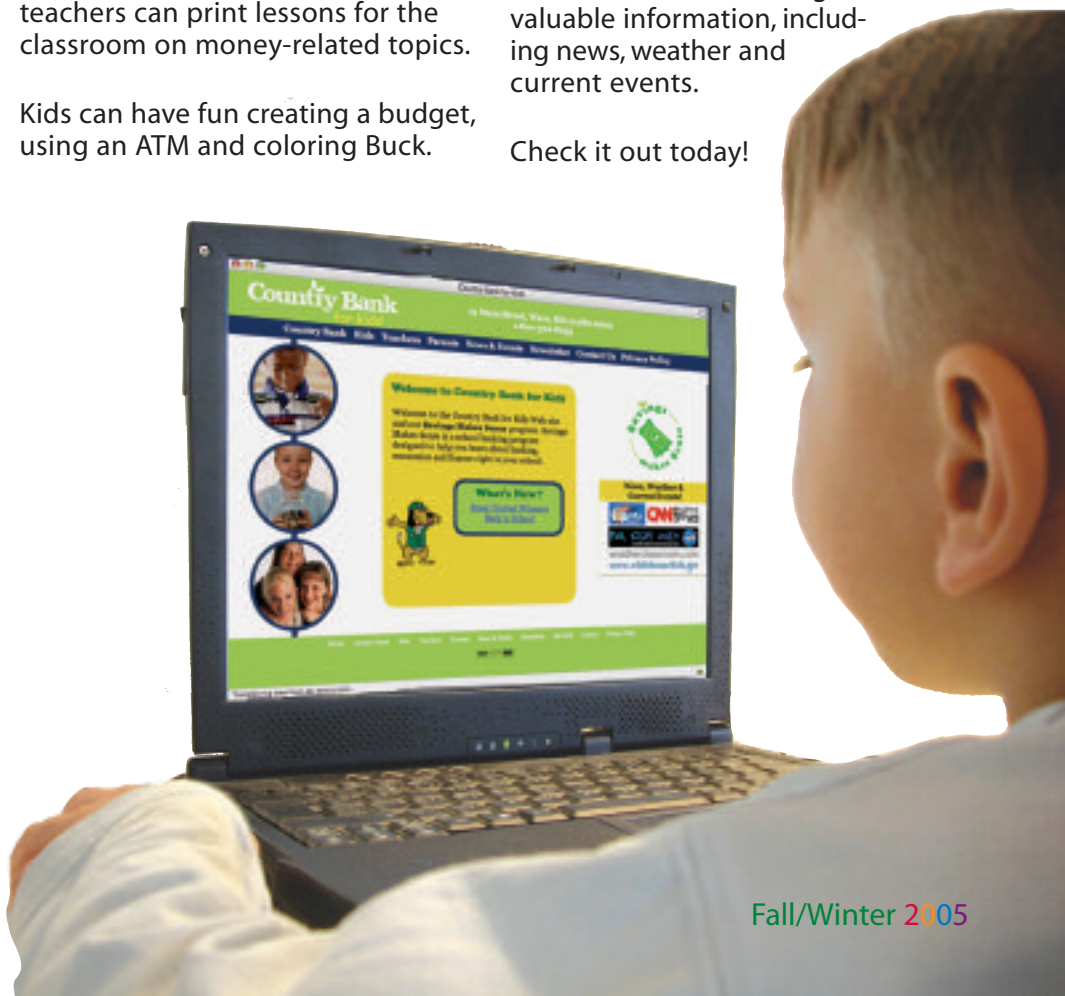
Kids can have fun creating a budget, using an ATM and coloring Buck.

# Knowing Math May Help You Save Money
